Living the Word

John 20: 19 – 31

On the day of his Resurrection, Jesus appeared to Mary Magdalene. In the evening of that same day, the Gospel explains, he came and stood among the disciples. Thomas was absent, however, and so Jesus comes again eight days later. The Resurrection appearances of the Lord do not end with Thomas; at the end of today's Gospel we read that there were many other signs Jesus brought about. With great care, Jesus comes to each group, one after the other, to strengthen their faith and fill them with His peace. Each receives what they need to believe in Him: for Mary it was to hear her name spoken; for Thomas it was to touch Christ's wounds: for Paul it would be a lifechanging encounter on the road. Jesus's actions show us that each one of us is precious in God's eyes.

Elements of the Mass: The Asperges

The aspergilium refers to the brush which is dipped in the holy water bucket so that the holy water can be sprinkled. The aspergilium can be used as part of the Penitential Rite at the beginning of Mass. This is called the Asperges when the celebrant sprinkles the people with holy water to remind them of their baptism and that their sins are forgiven. During Eastertide the aspergilium is used for the ceremony called Vidi Aquam. The baptismal water blessed at the Easter Vigil is sprinkled over the congregation to remind them that, in the book of Revelation, the prophet sees water flowing from the right side of the Temple, just as water flowed from the right side of Christ on the Cross. By the water of baptism, we are all saved.



Sunday 27th April 2025 2nd Sunday of Easter Gospel: John 20: 19 – end



Eight days after the Risen Lord had appeared to the Twelve minus Thomas, Thomas was blessed to experience what he had longed to see for himself. But Jesus assures him that even more blessed shall be those who have not seen and yet believe. This spiritual virtue of believing without seeing speaks of the gifts of the Holy Spirit in our lives. When the Risen Christ appears to his Apostles he breathes on them the sanctifying gift of the Holy Spirit and says: 'Peace be with you'. The Apostles are filled with the Spirit and His gifts. Among these is the gift to forgive sins in the name of Jesus. God's Divine Mercy dispels the curse of sin and death and through the ministry of reconciliation in the Church we are set free. His Spirit comes into our lives, we are made new, and receive the opportunity to start again. Even though we were dead, we are now alive in Christ Jesus for ever.
