Living the Word

Acts 11: 1-18

This is not the narration in Acts of the conversion of Cornelius, but Peter's rendering of it to the community when justifying his actions. Like the story of Paul's conversion, this story occurs three times in Acts, showing the importance of this moment when the first gentile is received into the Church.

Nevertheless, Peter is humble and witty enough to include his little tiff with the voice from heaven, whose liberalism so scandalised him, and which ended up by roundly ticking him off for his criticism of God's creation.

Jesus left the first generation of Christians unclear about whether observation of the kosher-rules of Judaism should continue.

Mark 7.19 has 'Thus he made all foods clean,' but the corresponding passage in Matthew deliberately leaves it out.

Matthew wrote his Gospel for Christians sprung from Judaism. As they considered Christianity to be the continuation and fulfilment of Judaism, they needed to think out the extent to which the rules and customs of Judaism still applied.

This gives us the valuable lesson that the Bible is not to be handled as a religious Google which supplies all the answers at the tap of a few keys.

Peter stresses that the Holy Spirit – and not himself – was responsible for the acceptance of the first gentile: in the original account the Spirit merely interrupted Peter, whereas now Peter says he hardly had time to begin speaking when the Spirit poured down.



Sunday 18th May 2025 5th Sunday of Easter Gospel: John 13: 31 – 35



Jesus, on the night of his betrayal, tells the disciples 'where I am going you cannot come'. At first hearing, this is a strange thing for Jesus to say. He had taught 'I am the way' and to 'follow me'. However, Jesus is referring to where he will go at the moment of his physical death. As we say in the Apostles creed, 'he descended into hell.' St Peter tells us in one of his letters (1 Peter 3) 'being put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit in which he went and proclaimed to the spirits in prison because they formerly did not obey'. Jesus goes where we cannot follow because he plummets the furthest point of darkness and death. He brings light and hope to even those who have rejected God. Only Jesus, the Son of God, who is Light and Life could do that. As St Paul says 'by his death he has destroyed death'. Jesus in descending into hell has also destroyed the power of him who had death at his command; the devil. Jesus experienced the absolute darkness and oblivion of death and opened up the gate of everlasting life. He went where we cannot go to prevent us going there.
