Living the Word

Psalm 67

This psalm is both a prayer and an expression of adoration. It begins with a prayer of supplication, asking that the very face of God should shine on us, and his ways known among all nations.

Its origins lie in a cultic thanksgiving for the harvest, as verses 6 and 7 show. However, the orientation of the psalm has undergone a complete change. There is a profound recognition that God is the source of all life. Furthermore, He is the ruler and the guide of all nations. This is an important insight given the small size of Israel and the presence of her powerful neighbours.

It is through this psalm – and indeed all the psalms – that the sovereignty of God is proclaimed and revealed. What lies at the heart of this psalm is the deep perception that worship is about the majesty and the holiness of God which draws our devotion away from the things of this world and the narrowness of our earthly limitations.

We are lifted up to a higher level by a vision of universal range and of great power, while looking at all things and all events with the eyes of God.

The result is that it is only by turning to God in gratitude that man avoids being overly burdened by earthly matters.

A right perspective is achieved when man's existence is placed in the light of the unfathomable mystery of salvation.

This is a psalm which excites our worship of God, and which expresses our deep desire for God to bless us so that His face may indeed shine upon us.



Sunday 25th May 2025 6th Sunday of Easter Gospel: John 14: 23 – 29



Jesus teaches that if we love him we will 'keep his word'. Later he says 'the word that you hear is not mine but the Father's who sent me'. The word that Jesus gives us to keep is life and light; it is truth and love. The word is beyond any ownership by any one person, but points beyond every person to the Father. Jesus himself is the Word of the Father, so the one who speaks divine truth is himself the Divine Son of the Divine Father. The eternal origin of the Word is in the Father – who is creator of all things visible and invisible. Jesus in giving us the word has opened up to us the possibility of knowing God's will and his mind.

It is love that is key to his word. As St Julian of Norwich said, 'by thought is God never holden, only by love.'
